Sharing

Unit Overview

In this unit, the children will learn about the godly virtue of sharing. Great biblical examples of generosity, from Abraham with Lot to the young boy who helped Jesus feed five thousand men, will be used to inspire and motivate the children. Ultimately, this unit stresses that God is the greatest of givers. The children will learn how God delights not only in sharing with them, but especially when they share with each other.

Unit Goals


- The children will identify two biblical examples of sharing: Abraham who shared his land with Lot, and the boy who shared his lunch with five thousand others.
- The children will compare and contrast "sharing" with "selfishness."
- The children will equate the act of sharing as pleasing to God, themselves and others.

Unit Contents -

Bible Truth Share with others. (Hebrews 13:16)

Lesson 1 A Boy Shares his Lunch

In this lesson, the children will hear the account of the boy who shared his small lunch with Jesus, who in turn fed five thousand men. The idea of sharing will be contrasted with selfishness as the children enjoy games and activities that help them make godly choices. They will also discover that sharing and happiness go hand in hand.



Lesson 2 | Love to Share

God's desire for children to share with one another is further emphasized in this lesson. The children will review the account of the boy who shared his lunch. They will also participate in activities that remind them and encourage them to share.

Lesson 3 Lot Chooses First

In this lesson, the children will learn about Abraham's decision to share with his nephew, Lot. Abraham's generosity to share his best land is emphasized. The children will also learn more about sharing as they work together making crafts and playing games that require cooperation.

Lesson 4 | Will Share

The story of Abraham's decision to share land with his nephew, Lot will be reviewed. The children will participate in a role playing activity that helps them discern acts of sharing and acts of selfishness. They will also make crafts that require them to share materials.
