Thankfulness Lesson 4

Preclass Centers

As the children arrive, guide them to a preclass center. Have no more than six children at each center.

Materials

Use the materials previously selected for this unit's preclass centers.


Preparation

- 1. Be sure to check the condition of the materials selected for this unit's preclass centers prior to set up. Replace any broken toys, or puzzles with missing pieces as necessary.
- 2. Set up the centers before the children come into the classroom.
- 3. Assign a teacher to each center and have the teachers stay in those centers until the singing begins.

Instructions

Guide the play in each center reinforcing the unit theme.

- IMPORTANT: Do not allow any small toys in the classroom. First check all toys for size. You can obtain a "safety cylinder" from a pediatrician. Any object that can fit into the cylinder is too small and could cause a child to choke.
- Be involved in the group play and offer guidance as needed.
- Wear comfortable clothes suitable for sitting on the floor.
- Smile! Be childlike in heart and alert in mind.







Thankfulness Lesson 4

Joseph's Coat

The children will hear the story of Joseph's coat.

Bible Story Text

Genesis 37:2a, 3b

Materials

For the teacher:

- Bible
- felt board with a black background
- felt board figures from the Unit 12 Lesson 3, Bible story
- construction paper, a different color for each child in the center

Preparation

- 1. Roll a piece of tape to stick to the back of each figure.
- 2. Cut each piece of construction paper in half.
- 3. Familiarize yourself with the Bible Story. Practice telling the story using the flannel board figures.

A Present

Open the Bible to Genesis. The Bible says there was once a daddy named Jacob. Put the Jacob figure on the felt board. He had a little boy named Joseph. Put the Joseph figure on the felt board. Joseph loved and obeyed his daddy. "Joseph, please go out and take care of the sheep," his daddy said. "OK, Daddy," said Joseph.

Remove Jacob. Add the sheep, pond and grass to the felt board. Joseph took the sheep to eat some grass. Move the sheep over to the grass. Then he took the sheep to a pond to get a drink. Move the sheep over to the pond. Joseph knew it was time to go home. "Come on, sheep," he said. The sheep followed him home. Remove the grass and water. Make the sheep follow Joseph. Remove the sheep.

Add Jacob to the felt board. When Joseph got home, his daddy said, "Thank you, Joseph. You did a great job with the sheep. I have a present for you." Joseph was so excited! His daddy wanted to give him a present! Ask the children, Who likes to get presents? What do you think Joseph's daddy was going to give him? Let the children respond. Tell them their ideas would make great gifts. It was a beautiful new coat! (Genesis 37:3b) Add the coat onto the Joseph figure.

Joseph's coat had many bright colors on it. He loved the bright colors! Hold the felt board close to the children and ask each child to point to a color. As the child points to a color, say: Do you know what color that is? That color is Red! Continue until each child has had a turn. Joseph loved his new coat. What do you think he said to his daddy? He said, "Thank you, Daddy! Thank you for my new coat."

Hold the felt board with Jacob, Joseph, and Joseph's new coat on it and sing "Joseph's Coat" from the Unit 12 Song Sheet.

NOTE: Save the felt board figures for the Unit 12 Lesson 5, Bible story.

Conclusion

Give each child a half of a piece of construction paper and put the matching halves on the floor in front of the children.

Let's pretend you want to make a coat the color that you are holding in your hand. Lydia, can you find the same color on the floor? Very good! Do you know what color that is? That color is yellow! Can everyone say "yellow"? Lydia can make a yellow coat. Repeat this with each of the children.


Show the felt board with the figures on it and sing Joseph's Coat one more time. Ask the children, What do you say when someone gives you something? Right! You say, "Thank you!"

Who had the coat of many colors? Yes, Joseph.


- Encourage the children as they try to name the colors. Many of them won't know all of their colors yet.

Lesli Gets a Present

The children will learn to be grateful for presents of clothing or gifts even if they are not toys.

Bible Truth

Give thanks to God. (Psalm 136:26)

Materials

For the teacher:

- felt board figures from Unit 12 Lesson 3, Life Application
- felt board

Preparation

Familiarize yourself with the song and the story.

Instructions

Introduce the family figures and sing "My Own Loving Family" from the Unit 12 Song Sheet.

Put Lesli on the felt board.

Lesli woke up smiling. "Today is my birthday!" she said to herself. "Today is the best day of the year!"

Put Dad on the felt board.

Lesli ran down the stairs. Her daddy was just finishing reading his Bible. She ran to give him a hug. "Daddy, Daddy!" she said. "Do you know what today is?"

"Let me think now. Could it be somebody's birthday?" "Yes!" said Lesli. "It is my birthday!" I get to have cake; blow out my candles; and I get presents. And the presents are the best part!"

Just then the doorbell rang. It was Grandma and Grandpa! Put Grandma and Grandpa and Mom on the felt board.

They had a big present wrapped in pretty paper with a shiny bow. "Is it for me?" she asked.

"Yes," said Grandpa, handing Lesli the present.

Lesli sat down on the floor to open her present. Lesli wondered what the present could be. Could it be a new baby doll? Could it be a new coloring book and crayons? Could it be a new stuffed animal? She ripped off the paper and opened the box. "Oh," said Lesli, looking sad, as she held up her present—"a sweater."

"How pretty!" said Mommy. "That was just what Lesli needed." "Lesli, what do you say?" But Lesli didn't say anything. The room got very quiet.

Take Grandma and Grandpa off of the felt board.

Grandma and Grandpa went into the other room and Daddy and Mommy sat down with Lesli. "Lesli," said Daddy, "You did not say thank you to Grandma and Grandpa. Grandma went shopping and picked out that sweater especially for you. Then she wrapped it up so pretty, so you would feel special."

Lesli started to cry. "But I wanted a new doll or a new coloring book or a new stuffed animal," she said. "I didn't want a sweater."

"Lesli," said Daddy, "you need to be grateful. When someone gives you a present, it is because they love you. You need to say 'thank you' and give them a big hug, even if the present is not a toy." Then Daddy opened his Bible and read to her about Joseph in the Bible, Joseph's daddy gave him a coat for a present. Joseph was very grateful and said, thank you.

"Now," said Daddy, "what do you need to say to Grandma and Grandpa?"

"I need to hug them and tell them I am sorry and thank them for my new sweater," said Lesli. "That's right," said Daddy and Mommy, smiling.

Put Grandma and Grandpa on the felt board.

"Grandma, Grandpa," said Lesli, "I am sorry. Thank you for my new sweater."

Grandma and Grandpa hugged her. "We forgive you. Let's go and try on the new sweater and see if it fits." said Grandma.

"OK." said Lesli, Lesli tried it on and went to look in the mirror. It looked pretty! She ran back to Grandma. "Thank you, Grandma," she said, hugging her. "I really like it! And you picked my favorite color!"

Bible Truth Activity


God wants us to be thankful for him and for the people he gives us in our families. Who remembers our Bible Truth? "Give thanks to God." Repeat the Bible Truth a few times with the children.

Conclusion

Thankfulness Lesson 4

Clothesline

The children will hang their clothes on a clothesline to dry. They will name the clothes, and thank God for them.

Materials

For each child:

- 1 sheet of light-colored construction paper
- glue stick

For the teacher:

- 3 pieces of fabric or felt, assorted colors or patterns
- scissors
- black marker
- yarn, string or twine

Reproducible Pages:

Page A, 1 copy for the teacher

Preparation

- 1. Cut out the clothes stencils from the copy of Reproducible
- 2. For each child, trace and cut out one shirt, one dress and one pair of pants from the three different fabric pieces.
- 3. Print "Thank You, God, for clothes." across the top of each sheet of construction paper. See Figure A.
- 4. Cut an 11" piece of yarn for each child.
- 5. Make a model of the craft following the instructions.

Instructions

- 1. Show the model to the children. Point to each article of clothing and ask the children what it is called. These clothes are hanging on a clothesline to dry. They have been washed, and now they are drying outside in the nice warm sunshine. Who gives us clothes? That's right, God gives us clothes. We wash and take care of our clothes because God gives them to us. Let's hang up our clothes on the clothesline to dry!
- 2. Give each child a sheet of construction paper and a piece of yarn.

- 3. Help the children glue the yarn across their construction paper as shown in Figure B.
- 4. Give the children each one article of clothing at a time. Ask the children, What is this? Yes it is a shirt. You can hang this shirt on your clothesline.
- 5. Help them glue each article of clothing directly under the piece of yarn. See Figure C.

Conclusion

Have the children point to and identify each article of clothing. If you have time, have the children point to and identify the clothes they are wearing.

End the activity by having the children pray aloud thanking God for clothing.


- Bring some small buttons or bits of lace to glue onto the dress and shirt.
- When you need to trace a paper shape many times, trace it onto poster board or cardboard first, and then cut it out to use as your stencil.
- Children enjoy correcting the teacher's first guess. For example, point to the dress and say, Is this a shoe? The children will laugh and say, "No. It's a dress!"



Thankfulness Lesson 4

I Take Care of My Clothes

The children will role play different activities that teach them how to take care of their clothes.

Bible Truth

Give thanks to God. (Psalm 136:26)

Materials

For the teacher:

- laundry basket
- assorted clean clothes that can be divided into two distinct groups, boy's clothes and girl's clothes
- 5 pairs of socks, each pair distinct from the others
- Bible

Preparation

- 1. Familiarize yourself with the song and activity.
- 2. Spread the clothes on the floor before class.

Instructions

Today we are going to learn to take care of our clothes and to be thankful for them. Are we supposed to throw our clothes on the floor? No! We are supposed to pick them up and put them in the laundry basket when they are dirty.

Point to the clothes on the floor. Who will help me pick up the clothes? Have the children pick up the clothes and put them into the laundry basket. As they pick up the clothes sing verse one of "Thank You God For Clothes" from the Unit 12 Song Sheet.

Now let's pretend the clothes are washing in the washing machine. Make washing machine noises. Now let's pretend the clothes are drying in the dryer. Make drying motions with your hands.

Now the clothes are finished washing and drying. We need to separate and fold the clothes. First, let's separate the boys' clothes from the girls' clothes into two piles. Let each child take an item of clothing from the basket and put the item into the appropriate pile. Continue until all the clothes are separated into two piles.

Sing verse two of "Thank You God for Clothes."

Now let's fold the clothes. Let each child fold an item and stack it in the basket. Assist them as needed. Sing verse three of "Thank You God for Clothes" while they are folding the clothes.

We have one more job to do. We need to match the socks! Put the socks on the floor and let each child have a turn finding a matching pair. Assist younger ones as needed. As the children work sing verse four of "Thank You God for Clothes."

Bible Truth Activity

God gives us beautiful clothes to wear. Open the Bible. The Bible says, "Give thanks to God." Let's all say that together. "Give thanks to God."

Conclusion

Let's say a prayer to give thanks to God. Dear God, thank you for giving us clothes to wear. Help us to be thankful and to take care of our clothes.

When we are thankful it makes God happy and helps people to see that God loves them

- Make the two piles of clothes as distinct as possible for sorting.
- · Make each pair of socks as distinct as possible for sorting (size, color, etc.).
- Children will not be able to fold and stack clothes neatly. Some will require assistance. Others will have a "do it myself" attitude. Allow them to fold the clothes and place them into the basket as neatly as they are able.

Joseph's Coat


Conclusion

Colorful Coat

The children will make colorful necklaces to remind them that God gives them clothes.

Materials

For each child:

glue stick

For the teacher:

- scissors
- black construction paper
- hole punch
- colored construction paper
- yarn or ribbon
- small container to hold cut squares of paper
- masking tape

Reproducible Pages:

Page B, 1 copy for the teacher

Preparation

- 1. Cut out the coat stencil from the copy of Reproducible Page B.
- 2. Trace and cut out a coat for each child from the black construction paper.
- 3. Punch a hole below the neckline of the coat. See Figure A.
- 4. Cut 1" squares from the colored construction paper. Cut fifteen squares for each child.
- 5. Cut a 36" piece of yarn for each child.
- 6. Make a model of the craft following the instructions.

Instructions

- 1. Put on the model of the necklace and show it to the children. Ask them, Do you know what this is hanging on my necklace? Yes, it is Joseph's coat of many colors! Today, you will make a colorful coat to wear as a necklace too!
- 2. Place the colored squares in a container near the children, and then have them choose their own squares.
- 3. Give the children each a coat. Have them glue their colored squares onto their coats.
- 4. Help the children thread the yarn through the hole in their coats.
- 5. Tie the ends of each child's yarn together making a necklace.


Conclusion


Talk with the children about the beautiful colors on their coats. Remind them of Joseph and his coat of many colors. Ask the children who gives them their coats and other clothes. God gives us our coats and all of our clothes! God gives us families who buy clothes for us.

- To save time, cut several pieces of colored paper at once or use a paper cutter.
- Cut a 2" length of masking tape, and then tape it in back of the spot where you will punch the hole. This will strengthen the hole site later.






